

Heroic Veracruz: Intersecting Cultures, Commerce and Conflict, 1519-1919.

This endeavor will offer the first nearly comprehensive English language history of the port of Veracruz as a dynamic place where Mesoamericans, Spanish colonizers, slave traders, African peoples, pirates, merchants, bureaucrats, insurrectionists, and foreign invaders significantly determined the fate of the Western world.

A companion to my colonial and national period text, this volume features chapters on the late nineteenth and twentieth century history of the state of Veracruz with essays on public health, immigration, business history, labor organizing, the celebration of Carnival, tourism, photography and photojournalism, cinematic portrayals of the city, popular music, poetry and the war on journalists.
